Web Browser Glitch

Q. I have just upgraded my Netscape browser and find that I can no longer use my web browser to upload files to your FTP site. Do you know what happened?

A. For unknown reasons, Netscape decided to drop FTP functionality some time ago.

You have three choices to solve the problem: switch to Internet Explorer, obtain FTP client software or send your files as e-mail attachments.

For better or worse, Microsoft's free Explorer has become the industry standard. Virtually all Macintosh and Windows operating systems have the browser built in so you can use our drag-and-drop web interface to transfer your files to our FTP site.
