#### **Added Features**

Features we are incorporating into the new system include:

• A simple form to complete. The information will be automatically included with your files upload.

With our current system, you need to e-mail or fax us your order specs.

• A file tracking number is also automatically assigned.

Our current system doesn't offer tracking capabilities.

- You will get an e-mail message confirming that the upload was successful and giving you the assigned file tracking number.
- You may also opt to have your production coordinator notified that your files have been uploaded.

#### Your Help Needed

We want to stress that this is a beta testing program. We have made great strides and now need your assistance.

We hope you will give the new process a try. Just log on via the URL in the internet box and follow the instructions. After your test run, please take a couple of minutes to let us know what you think about the overall process, the clarity of our instructions and ease of use.

## **Suggestions Welcomed**

We also welcome your suggestions for improvements or additional features you would like to see. Please let us know what operating system and version you're using.

A Java applet expands the functionality of the new system. To take advantage of these added features, Java should be enabled in your web browser.

For example, Java will allow you to upload complete folders, rather than sending individual files one at a time.

You can still use our normal web file transfer site until this new system is functioning to your satisfaction.


# **Speaking of Paper**
