Bindery Upgrade

We upgraded our shrinkwrapping department with the addition of a new Beseler system to ensure that your digital printing projects arrive in tip-top condition.

With Copresco's shrinkwrapping process, a polymer plastic film is heated as it passes through the heat tunnel of the system.

This causes the plastic to shrink and conform to the shape of the book and creates a tight protective seal.

Well Organized

We can shrinkwrap virtually any of your projects for you. Some of the most commonly wrapped items are looseleaf

publications which can be subject to damage in transit if inserted into ring binders before shipping.

Instead the contents are securely shrinkwrapped and packaged with the accompanying 3-ring binders.

Shrinkwrapping individual or multiple perfect or saddle bound books is another application. Wrapping adds an extra layer of protection during shipping.

Is There a Santa Claus?

"Yes, Virginia, there is a Santa Claus" is a phrase from an editorial called "Is There a Santa Claus?"

The editorial appeared in the September 21, 1897, edition of The New York Sun.

Eight-year-old Virginia O'Hanlon wrote a letter to the Sun's editor and the quick response was printed as an unsigned editorial.

World Renowned

The work of veteran newsman Francis Pharcellus Church has since become history's most reprinted newspaper editorial, appearing in part or whole in dozens of languages in books, movies, and other editorials, and on posters and stamps.

About Virginia

Laura Virginia O'Hanlon was born on July 20, 1889, in New York City. Although divorced, she kept her exhusband's surname the rest of her life and was known as Laura Virginia O'Hanlon Douglas.

She received her Bachelor of Arts from Hunter College in 1910, a master's degree in education from Columbia University in 1912, and a doctorate from Fordham University in 1930.

Lifetime Educator

She started her career as an educator in 1912, became a junior principal in 1935, and retired in 1959.

According to reports, she received a steady stream of mail about her letter throughout her life. She would include a copy of the editorial in her replies. In an interview later in life, she credited it with shaping the direction of her life in a positive way.

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


